


Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Monday, 2 March, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 2 March, 2026

A slow-moving front brings rain, drizzle and low cloud to England and Wales, also eastern Scotland at first. To the east of this, strong to gale-force winds at first east. Lighter winds for much of the Highlands all day, cloud lifting with sunny spells. Later in day, rain and hill snow moves in from west.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Fairly light wind. Patchy rain soon fades, cloud lifts.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 2 March, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	South turning southwesterly; 50mph prior to dawn in east, but easing rapidly by sunrise. Much of daytime 15-20mph. Turning westerly after dark.
Effect of wind on you?	Soon fairly small, occasionally more blustery on high tops, feeling chilly.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Early rain fading A band of rain early in day breaking up during morning, to leave increasingly dry conditions, soonest west. After dark, some showery rain arriving from west, snow above 800m.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting and clearing Covering most higher slopes with some lower patches from dawn, for longest in east. Tending to rise with breaks forming to most tops.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	40% rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloudy start, but some sun breaking through increasingly from west. Visibility becoming excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m)	2 or 3C, dropping later toward 0C. If exposed to wind, feeling like -5C.
Freezing Level	Above summits from overnight into morning, likely to lower during day, toward 1000m up to dusk, 800m after dark.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 3 March	Wednesday 4 March
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Variable direction 10-15mph or less. Small.	Southerly 25 to 35mph, very gusty in places around higher tops and locally downslope toward north. Blustery over higher terrain, affecting ease of walking and balance on exposed ridges. Considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Precipitation not expected	Little if any precipitation A little fine drizzle possible around cloud.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Little if any Rare if any fragments of cloud, or mist lower down at first, all clearing. 90%	Risk persistent on many tops Cloud banks may widely cover many hills above 700-800m, particularly south-facing slopes. Some breaks forming mainly north of major hill groups. 30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely sunny, possibly some high cloud away to the south. Visibility excellent.	Glimpses of sun mostly on northern aspects, but largely cloudy, some haze, but visibility fairly good out of cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	-1C rising to +2C. 800m plus frost in most glens and sheltered lower slopes from dawn, rising to 1100-1200m afternoon.	1 or 2C. Directly in the wind feeling like -10C. Patchy frost in glens and sheltered higher areas from dawn, staying close to freezing some slopes above 1200m.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 3 March, 2026**

Varying conditions over the next couple of weeks as areas of high pressure build across the British Isles then slip eastwards. Some dry and bright days with light winds mixed with periods of strengthening southerly winds bringing occasional rain coming in from the west - Thursday this week sees rain move increasingly onto western hills. Temperatures will vary, often lifting just above freezing to higher tops, but occasionally dropping back below freezing - chillier air briefly later this week. Some frosts into valleys. Remaining old snow cover on Scottish mountains stays largely consolidated with little change, patchy around highest tops in England and Wales.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Sunday, 1 March, 2026
