

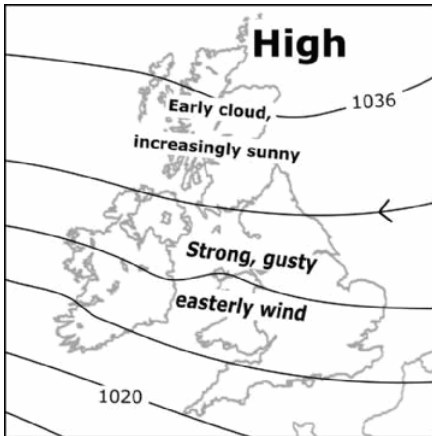
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Tuesday, 21 April, 2026



British Mountain Summary:
Based on forecast chart for noon 21 April, 2026

Brisk easterly winds for all areas will give considerable chill factor across the mountains; very gusty toward the west. A little patchy rain at first, otherwise a generally dry day. Cloud banks over the hill early in the day, particularly in the east, but increasingly breaking up to leave clear hills and sunshine.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Blustery, gusty spots. Cloud breaking, sunshine.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 21 April, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Easterly 25 to 30mph, gusty in places around high tops and some passes, strongest on hills nearer the central belt.
Effect of wind on you?	Marked wind chill in exposure, some blustery spots affecting ease of walking.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Early patchy flurries fade From the early hours through to dawn or just after, snow flurries above 600m, patchy light rain lower slopes, passing westwards over an hour or so early in day. Fading out to leave dry conditions.
Cloud on the hills?	Covering tops for a time, lifting, clearing Cloud banks covers some slopes above 600-800m early in the day, lowest in eastern areas; higher tops may be near top of the cloud layer. Tending to lift higher up and increasingly all break up. Low cloud returns to eastern areas into night.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	50% at first, rising above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy start, then patchy cloud with sunshine increasingly breaking through. Visibility very good then excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m)	-1C in morning, rising to 2 or 3C afternoon. Directly in the wind, feeling as cold as -10C in the morning.
Freezing Level	800m early morning, rising just above freezing to highest tops afternoon.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Easterly 15-20mph, but local gusty spots 25-30mph, typically strongest around higher mountains nearer the central belt. Fairly small, but locally uncomfortable gusts, not just on higher slopes. Feeling chilly in exposure.	Easterly 10 to 15mph, local gusty 20mph some mountains in Callander area. Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No precipitation expected	No precipitation expected
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Patches some mid-upper slopes Some cloud banks early in the day, mostly toward the east, patchier westwards; base around 600-700m, whilst tops above 1100m likely poke above the cloud. Tending to disperse. 80%	Little or none Patchy fog in glens, possible low cloud around some southern hill slopes for a time, fragments may drift briefly upslope, but all dispersing. Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine and broken cloud around some hills for a time; lower eastern areas may be under cloudier skies for a few hours. Visibility excellent out of cloud.	Increasingly sunny, possibly thin high cloud. Visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	0 to 2C rising to 4 to 6C afternoon, typically warmest central highlands west of A9. Around freezing on some higher slopes in the morning, also frost in glens at dawn. Rising above freezing to tops.	5C rising to 9C, locally warmer during afternoon. Frost in glens and some sheltered higher areas at dawn. Otherwise above freezing to the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 22 April, 2026

Staying dry through the remainder of this week and likely into the weekend as high pressure centred to the north stays nearby. Strong and gusty easterly winds tending to lessen later in the week to leave mostly light winds onward into the weekend. Temperatures generally a few degrees above freezing on higher tops, though often some frost in valleys and sheltered higher terrain at dawn. Western areas generally sunniest and warmest, some low cloud banks over eastern hills in the mornings, early fog patches some valleys. Commonly dry weather likely into next week too, chance of local showers occasionally.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Monday, 20 April, 2026
