

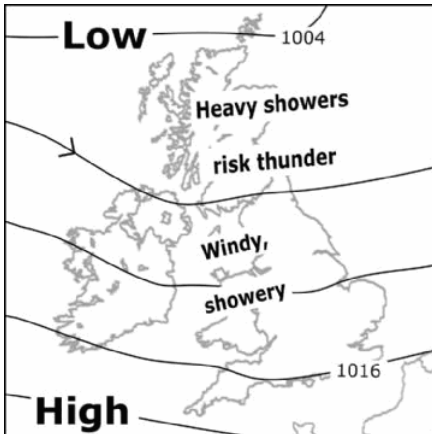
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Tuesday, 9 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 9 June, 2026

Generally showery, heavy bursts with risk of thunder, particularly more eastern areas afternoon into evening. Strongest west to southwesterly winds for England and Wales. Rather chilly, notable wind chill in exposure on hills. Cloud varying over the tops.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Cool and showery, increasing heavy bursts, local thunder.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 9 June, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southwesterly 10 to 15mph in morning, then shifting westerly into afternoon, rising from the west 15 to 25mph, reaching west-northwesterly 30mph for a time late afternoon-early evening, some stronger gusts in south.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small in morning, then increasingly blustery afternoon, suddenly gusty around showers and later more generally impeding ease of walking over some tops, with a considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers developing widely, risk thunderstorms afternoon-evening. Isolated showers mostly in west at first, otherwise dry start in east. However, showers developing from west to become widespread middle of day onward into afternoon, heavy downpours moving eastward toward evening. Risk thunder. Some hail. Wet snow at times on highest summits.
Cloud on the hills?	Occasional over upper slopes Hills clear at times, however in showery rain, patches or banks forming, mainly above 800-1000m, but varying in extent in and out of showers, ragged patches briefly to lower elevations.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patches of sun, most frequent eastern hills in morning, then clouding over widely. Visibility very good, but sometimes poor in showers.
How Cold? (at 900m)	3 to 5C, highest by mid afternoon. Feeling below freezing in the breeze, nearer -5C toward evening.
Freezing Level	Close to very highest tops

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 10 June	Thursday 11 June
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	West to southwesterly 15 to 25mph, tending to rise, locally 30mph at times southern hills later afternoon. Mostly small until afternoon, but marked wind chill where exposed to the strongest breeze, particularly later in day.	Southerly 20 to 30mph, risk reaching gusty 35-40mph higher summits for a time, later may turn southwesterly. Blustery over higher mountains, at times affecting ease of walking and balance on exposed ridges. Considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers forming widely, risk thunder. Mostly dry start. Then showers will move in and also develop further across the area to become widely showery in afternoon, hail and thunder, sleet tops. Later in day, heavier showers focused toward east, odd light showers west.	Rain most persistent west Rain soon spreading in from the southwest, lasting much of the day central highlands, where some steadier heavier falls at times, somewhat patchier in east.
Cloud on the hills?	Forming on tops in rain Often clear in the morning, brief patches, but as showers develop widely, banks lower onto higher terrain above 800m and linger for a while, varied patches	Extensive Possibly varied cloud banks early in day, but soon low cloud filling in widely, to lower elevations southern slopes, shrouding most hills above 600m with time.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	70% dropping to 40% in rain	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Best sun early in day, before skies tend to fill in with cloud by late morning. Visibility very good, but poor in afternoon showers.	Overcast and dull, local brighter start in east, but cloudy. Visibility good if dry in east, otherwise generally poor in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	3 to 5C, chilliest in the morning. Feeling near -5C in the stronger breeze. Close to highest summits through morning, then rising further above tops.	3C rising to 6C. Feeling like -5 to -8C directly in wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 10 June, 2026**

A changeable pattern continues this week with west-southwesterly winds prevailing, bringing a mix of rain and showers in from the Atlantic. A period of more persistent rain on Thursday. Pressure tends to rise from the south toward the weekend, bringing warmer air and drier conditions particularly England & Wales, although western mountains will remain often cloudy, some patchy rain remaining in west and northwest Scotland into the weekend. Into next week, a mixed southwesterly pattern remains possible, with some rain, drizzle and low cloud mostly in the west, but with higher pressure trying to expand northward, the week looks generally drier and warmer than the present time.
