

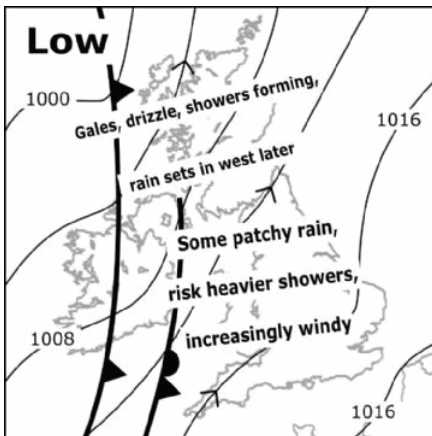
# Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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## General Summary for Saturday, 27 June, 2026



### British Mountain Summary:

**Based on forecast chart for noon 27 June, 2026**

Widely windy, afternoon gales across Scotland, possibly Lakeland and Snowdonia too. In Scotland, drizzle gives way to showery rain, setting in late in the day over western hills. Patchy rain England and Wales with dry windows and warm sunny moments, but a rising risk of showery bursts through afternoon, locally heavy.

Some early drizzle; afternoon gales and showery rain, risk thunder

## Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 27 June, 2026

<b>How windy? (On the Munros)</b>	Southerly 25-30mph strengthening to peak speeds in range 40mph to possibly 50mph for a time afternoon, a period of stronger gusts high tops.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Expect strenuous walking conditions from dawn, increasingly challenging in places with buffeting gusts knocking you off balance. Feeling chilly.</b>
<b>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</b>	<b>Drizzle, bursts of rain, risk thunder</b> A drier window in morning, some drizzle around high hills in cloud, but increasing risk of showery bursts developing, locally heavy with risk of thunder. More persistent falls forming towards central highlands late in the day.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Lifting but rarely clearing summits, lowering around rain</b> Fairly extensive cloud banks in the morning, to many lower slopes. Some rise of base and local breaks possible for a time around midday/afternoon, though only brief breaks to or above 900m. In rain, lowering, filling in again, low ragged patches.
<b>Chance of cloud free Munros?</b>	<b>30%</b>
<b>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</b>	Brief glimpses of sun, best chances midday/afternoon. Misty many slopes in morning. Visibility improving for a time where dry below cloud, but poor again around rain.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>	12 or 13C to start rising only slightly, up to 15C near Glenshee. Still rather humid. Feeling like 5C in direct wind.
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits.

## Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

<b>How windy? (On the Munros)</b> <b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	Southwesterly 20-30mph, trending towards higher speeds, gusting 35-40mph over high tops late in the day. <b>Ease of walking impacted, increasingly strenuous through afternoon and feeling cool.</b>	West-southwesterly 30-35mph at dawn, gusty over the tops. Easing to finish near 15-25mph. <b>Strenuous walking early with considerable buffeting and wind chill in exposure; easing to fairly small effects by evening.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Morning rain, scattered patches afternoon</b> Several bands of rain drift west-to-east through morning, brief heavy falls and dry windows. By afternoon, likely just patchy rain, greatest chance central highlands, though risk a cluster of later showers.	<b>Scattered patchy rain</b> Patchy rain drifting from the west at dawn soon begins isolating towards central highlands, may largely ease except for spots around Callander. East of A9 substantially dry.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Summits increasingly clearing afternoon</b> Variable bases from 700-900m through morning, or lower during heavier rain. Through afternoon, rising with high breaks forming, and likely above the summits later.	<b>Fairly extensive central highlands, improving</b> Most hills shrouded above 700-800m at dawn, to locally 500m or lower central highlands. Soon to lift and begin breaking east of A9, many summits seeing breaks afternoon. Slower to improve west where banks often come and go above 800m.
<b>Chance of cloud free Munros?</b>	<b>30% rising to 80%</b>	<b>30% rising to 70%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	A few glimpses of morning sunshine, then a patchwork of cloud and sun afternoon. Visibility becomes excellent.	A patchwork of cloud and sun, most extensive sun well-east. Very good visibility.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b> <b>Freezing Level</b>	8 to 10C, mildest east Munros in the morning, slight cooling trend afternoon. Feeling near freezing in strongest wind. Above the summits.	6 or 7C, rising to 10C. Feeling below freezing in strongest wind. Above the summits.

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 28 June, 2026**

Cooler on Sunday as the weather pattern returns to an Atlantic influence. Bands of rain sweep eastward early Sunday, followed by fresher, sunnier weather with some patchy showers in the north and west. This westerly Atlantic pattern dominates next week: high pressure south and low pressure north will bring alternating periods of rain punctuated by bright sunshine. Wind generally on the strong side with mild to sometimes warm temperatures, though cooler and windier spells at times produce significant wind chill on Scottish tops. Day-to-day detail currently uncertain, but western hill groups from Lakeland northward will see the most cloud and patchy rain, while east and southern areas likely drier and sunnier. This pattern is indicated to continue into the following weekend.

**Forecast issued at 16:30 on Friday, 26 June, 2026**
