

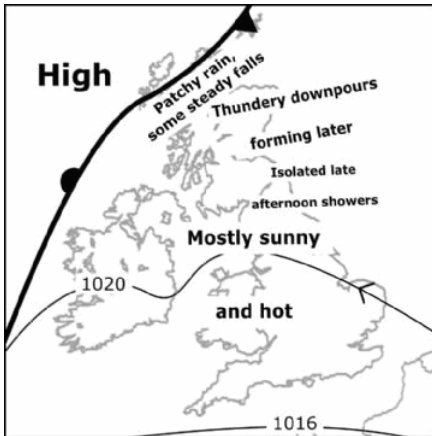
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Friday, 10 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 10 July, 2026

Hot sunshine persists across England, Wales, and southern Scotland; valley temperatures of 30C+. Starting bright and becoming very warm most of Scottish Highlands. Rain from Lochaber northward, later moving east with heavy thundery bursts forming over central/east highlands into evening.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Very warm, some sunshine; thunderstorms forming later

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 10 July, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Variable 10mph or less. A slight easterly trend with time, slightly strengthening later, some notable gusts around later thunderstorms.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible until late.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Dry well into the day, then thundery downpours forming The Munros stay dry through morning and well into the afternoon. From mid-afternoon onward, rising risk of bursts of rain forming, later more widely with thundery downpours.
Cloud on the hills?	Largely clear until later Some patchy mist here and there in glens and corries, perhaps an odd ribbon of cloud on middle and upper slopes in the morning, this mostly dissipating soon after dawn for cloud-free hills. As rain becomes more frequent, cloud reforms at varied elevations.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	90%, lowering to 60% late in the day
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some weak sun through a veil of high cloud, more often shrouded towards central highlands and later more widely cloudy. Visibility mostly very good, some early mist, then locally misty later where rain occurs.
How Cold? (at 900m)	14C rising to 18C, very warm and rather humid (glens reaching 25C).
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Generally easterly 10-15mph, strongest breezes around Callander; locally lower speeds. Small.	East-southeasterly 10mph, occasionally approaching 15mph around Callander. Small to negligible.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzle with periods of rain Rain comes and goes, some steadier falls with a risk of local heavy bursts. With time, rain trending lighter and patchier. Drizzly on the high tops much of the day.	Spotty drizzle A lingering drizzle on the summits in the morning, this tending to fade. Some chance of a few spots of drizzle rain returning, but these very localised, most Munros becoming dry.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Fairly extensive Extensive to low slopes at dawn, including fog into glens, particularly towards the east lowlands. Bases tending to rise, breaks to 700-900m, highest towards Loch Ericht, but any higher breaks highly localised and fleeting. 30%	Fairly extensive, breaking tendency At dawn, extensive cloud to most lower slopes, many places into glens. Lifting through morning, bases towards central highlands increasingly broken to or above 900m afternoon. East of A9, breaks above 800m will be rare and fleeting. 20%, rising to 40% towards central highlands
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast, sometimes dull and poor visibility on high terrain. Where below cloud, visibility will be very good.	Overcast, misty on high terrain to start. Glimpses of sun breaking out, best breaks west with very good visibility. Cloudiest near east lowlands.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	11 to 13C. Above the summits.	10 or 11C, rising to 12C towards central highlands. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 11 July, 2026**

Staying warm in Scotland, hot for England and Wales into the weekend. High pressure shifts northward, facilitating a strengthening easterly wind across most areas. Some lingering cloud and rain over the Scottish Highlands Saturday with some risk of heavier thundery bursts on Saturday morning in the east. The weekend is likely dry across England and Wales with fairly extensive sun, some sea fog increasingly affecting northeastern hill groups later weekend.

Easterly wind persists next week, sometimes quite strong England and Wales. Mostly sunny and very warm, including Scottish Highlands. Low pressure south of the country starts pushing showers into Wales, some heavy and thundery, though confidence is low. Detail increasing uncertain later next week, but Scotland likely stays dry.
