

Southeastern Highlands

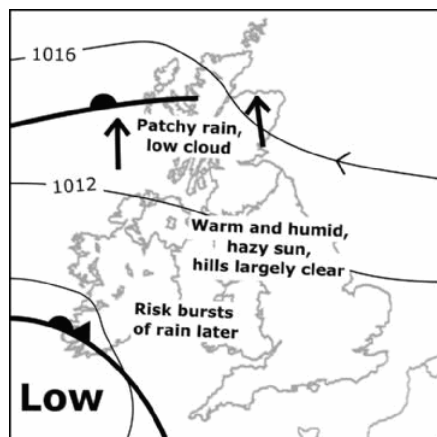
The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Monday, 3 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 3 August, 2026

Some rain drifts north across Scotland, with low cloud banks mostly on south-facing hill groups. A gusty east-southeasterly wind all day England & Wales, and strengthens with time across the Highlands. Humid with warm sun and thin high cloud for England & Wales, later risk of rain in west.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Rain at times, hills often covered. Increasing gusty wind.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 3 August, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Easterly 15mph at first; tending to strengthen from south toward 25mph; very gusty in places, 30-35mph later afternoon central highlands. Continuing to increase into evening-night widely to 35-40mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Starting fairly small, but becoming blustery, expect sudden gusts to develop (sometimes on lower slopes) making balance tricky. Deteriorating further toward dusk.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Intermittent rain and drizzle Steady rain and drizzle develops from south from early morning, some constant rain during morning, extending northward, breaking up a little, but a little rain on and off afternoon. Onward into night, heavier rain moves in widely.
Cloud on the hills?	Often covering hills Varied banks of cloud around the hills, lowest on south-facing slopes, filling in as rain occurs. May often cap higher tops much of the day, but some breaks occasionally, mainly toward Loch Rannoch.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, at best a veil of high cloud obscuring sun. Visibility good below cloud, reduced at times in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C, little change all day. Feeling near to freezing directly in the stronger wind on tops.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 4 August	Wednesday 5 August
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Easterly 25 to in places a gusty 35mph; probably easing to 15mph from the south. Sudden buffeting in gusty winds both higher up and on some lower slopes and valleys. Expect balance to be tricky.	Speed and direction likely to vary considerably, a possible lull below 20mph, but risk increasing northerly 30mph. At times may be fairly small, but beware of changing conditions affecting ease of walking on high terrain.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Raining most or all day Bands of rain will circulate within an area of low pressure, giving rain intermittently or frequently throughout the day.	Frequent or persistent rain Areas of rain likely to affect the region much of the day, risk setting in heavier for periods with some thundery downpours mixed in. Local drier windows possible.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Blanket of fog across the hills Blanket of fog across higher ares, sometimes the cloud below 300m Angus and Ochils. Breaks to 700m, mainly west of A9. 10%	Extensive Shrouding mountains widely much of the day, with ragged patches from lower slopes up around heavier rain. Rare breaks toward some higher slopes. 20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine unlikely. Visibility often poor.	Little or no sun. Visibility poor during rain, occasionally improving.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	8C Above the summits.	8 or 9C, little change all day. Feeling near or below freezing in the stronger wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 4 August, 2026**

Low pressure circulates slowly over Britain into midweek bringing areas of rain and thundery showers widely, accompanied by brisk winds up to gale force for periods. Trending toward westerlies later in the week and next weekend, by then most rain and low cloud in western Scotland, but showery rain elsewhere at times. Generally fresh temperatures widely, often in mid-single figures over Scottish high tops. Despite falls of rain, beware of ongoing fire management restricting access to hills locally.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Sunday, 2 August, 2026
