

Southeastern Highlands

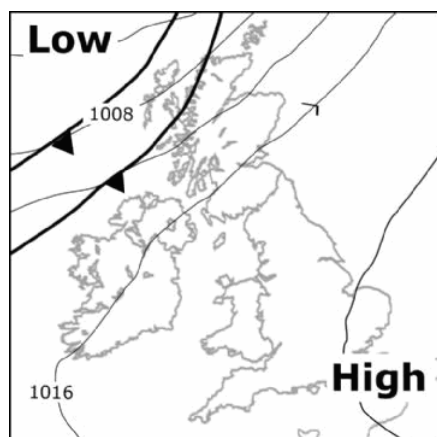
The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Erich, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Saturday, 8 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 8 August, 2026

Ranging from persistent gales, and increasingly toward west and north, rain and fog across the Scottish Highlands to blustery but largely dry Cumbria and S Scotland. Extensively warm and sunny elsewhere.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Upland wind near gale. Fog higher areas. Increasingly wet later.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 8 August, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southerly 25 to on higher tops 30mph or on central highlands 35-40mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Arduous or strenuous conditions with marked wind chill. Balance sometimes difficult.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Occasional rain, mainly west of A9, spreading east afternoon Isolated pockets of rain until early or mid afternoon. Then rain gradually setting in west of A9. Rain will gradually extend east toward Glenshee, but, mostly 'spots in the wind' until evening (when heavier).
Cloud on the hills?	Covering higher areas most or all day Typically lowest cloud base west of A9; varying between 600 and 800m. Elsewhere, typically 750 to 1000m. Will tend to lower in rain late in day.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchy weak sun, mainly morning. Slowly deteriorating from northwest to overcast and dull conditions with poor visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9 to 11C, warmest Angus and Ochls. Feeling below freezing in direct wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Sunday 9 August	Monday 10 August
How windy? (On the Munros)	Westerly 40mph post dawn; dropping from north during morning to 25 or 30mph.	Northwesterly 15-25mph morning, progressively dropping to very low speeds later in day.
Effect of wind on you?	Likely to impede ease of walking on higher areas - though probably strenuous for a few hours in morning.	Fairly small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Becoming dry Uncertainty in timing of clearance south of a front: Most likely rain on and off, clearing through morning from northwest.	Chance of a shower Chance isolated brief showers; not heavy.
Cloud on the hills?	Cloud base rising but remaining extensive on higher areas Cloud base rising through morning or perhaps into the afternoon to typically 850 to 1000m although will probably clear all summits near and east of Glenshee.	All clearing Patches some higher slopes will clear by about mid morning.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	Rising to 60%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A cloudy start will gradually give way to a patchwork of or extensive sun. Very good or excellent visibility developing.	Periods of sun - perhaps through areas of high level cloud. Excellent or increasingly superb visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C. Feeling near freezing in direct wind at first.	6C, rising toward 13C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 9 August, 2026

Extensively fine and warm early next week - indeed very little rain or low cloud and frequently light winds England and Wales all week.

Generally less settled after midweek northwestwards across Scotland where occasional rain and areas of low cloud.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Friday, 7 August, 2026

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
