

Southeastern Highlands

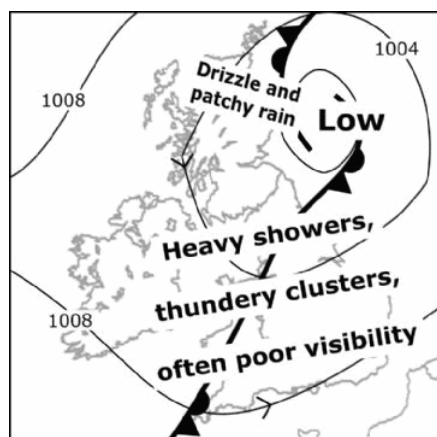

General Summary for Friday, 28 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 28 August, 2026

Frequent rain for England and Wales well into the day, clustering into heavy falls and local thunderstorms; poor visibility on many tops and some fast flowing streams. Easing to lighter showers later. Rain and drizzle over north and notably east Scotland, best of clear hills west highlands. Widely warm and humid.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Drizzle and hill cloud east of A9, drier and cloud breaks south

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 28 August, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Northeasterly shifting northwesterly, 10-15mph, strengthening slightly, particularly east of the A9 where strongest gusts later will approach 35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small; a notable breeze picks up on eastern summits, some buffeting gusts starting to affect stability late in the day.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some drizzle and patchy rain Drizzly over high terrain, particularly near and east from Loch Ericht towards Glenshee. Hills further south soon clear drizzle, some patchy rain will develop, but totals generally light. Some chance of steadier falls forming near and east of Glenshee.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive to start, lifting, best breaks southern Munros Hill shrouded from at least middle slopes upward, lowest bases north and east, approaching glen level in rain. Slight rise, and breaking up somewhat south of Loch Tay.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%, rising to 40%, to 60% south of Loch Tay
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast, often dull near and east of Loch Ericht, poor visibility on tops. Sun glimpses break out further south, good visibility out of cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m)	11 to 13C, rising locally to 14C near and south of Loch Tay.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Generally northwesterly but variable, 10-15mph and sometimes less. Later, may shift easterly, speeds locally to 20mph. Small.	Generally southerly, 5 to 15mph, though variable in both speed and direction. Small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Periods of rain, mostly light A fine drizzle on high terrain in the morning, damp to lower elevations just at dawn. Drizzle fades, though a few spots of light rain break out here and there, and some extended falls forming but mostly light.	Patchy rain, heavier falls forming Patchy rain here and there much of the day, generally local in nature, with early drizzle on high terrain. Heavier falls will form as well, more widely later.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Varied over high terrain, some breaks Patchy cloud above 500-600m early, a few more varied bases towards central highlands. A lifting trend, breaking up somewhat with summit breaks for several hours. Tending to fill in later as rain arrives. 60% for a time	Lifting towards summits for a time High terrain starts shrouded, and may well be fairly extensive on east slopes in the morning. A lifting trend, bases may approach 900-1000m for several hours with a chance of some summit breaks, but as rain increases, cloud will fill back in, increasingly low. Rising to 50% for a time
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchy sunshine, tending to cloud over. Visibility generally quite good, locally deteriorating in rain, later more widely poor on high terrain.	A patchwork of sun, very good visibility where out of fog, but trending overcast with visibility increasingly poor later.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	9 or 10C, rising towards 12C. Above the summits.	9 or 10C, rising slightly, locally to 12C. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 29 August, 2026

A generally damp weekend ahead, particularly in England and Wales: several bands of rain will pass west-to-east, cloud often shrouding hills, particularly west where only slightly improving away from the main areas of rain. Some stronger wind will affect Wales at times, notably south. Less rain over Scotland, though a little drizzly rain here and there will become local showery bursts through afternoon; variable cloud, tending to lift during the day but returning where rain forms. Also minimal wind in Scotland, mild temperatures.

Westerly flow is expected next week, drawing cloud and showers into western areas, particularly in Scotland, with periods of strong wind and broader areas of rain more widely across the country. Best of bright breaks to the east.
