
Southern Uplands

The Galloway hills eastward to the Lammermuir hills. The Cheviots (including higher hills within the adjacent Northumberland NP).



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General Summary for Saturday, 29 March, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 29 March, 2025

Deteriorating rapidly as a front, particularly active in western Scotland, brings precipitation and upland gales - or on Scottish highlands storm force winds. Heavy snow for a few hours mainly western Scotland, mostly rain elsewhere. Total rainfall small south toward S Pennines and Wales.

Headline for Southern Uplands

Deteriorating quickly middle of day: upland wind near gale; rain and snow.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 29 March, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Increasingly windy after a morning lull when westerly less than 20mph. Into afternoon southwest 35, perhaps 45mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Walking becoming arduous or difficult and wind chill significant.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its	Rain spreading east afternoon Substantially dry until midday.	
impact)	Then 2 or 3 hours of rain Galloway and soon Dumfriesshire and summits immediately east of the upper Tweed. Will then ease to showers. Further east the afternoon rain on and off Borders before largely clearing.	
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, particularly in rain	
	Cloud base typically 800m temporarily late morning. Will then lower, mainly Dumfries and Galloway and immediately east of the upper Tweed, to around 300 or 400m (lower near Solway). Mostly above 400m near Lothians and The Cheviot.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% dropping to 10%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patches of sunshine, mainly Borders, will soon give way as cloud thickens. Excellent visibility but very poor in rain.	
How Cold? (at 750m)	0C rising to 2C. Will feel as cold as minus 10C directly in the wind.	
Freezing Level	750m before lifting above the summits from west through afternoon.

Near the Solar the cloud may be widely below 200m, only slowly lifting before perhaps eventually clearing.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 30 March, 2025

Pressure will rise across the UK early next week, bringing extensively dry and for a few days very warm weather - albeit on Monday the remnants of fronts will bring a little rain but extensive low cloud to some western mountains. Later next week, some forecasts suggest a marked drop in temperature levels as the high pressure shifts position to the north of Scotland.
