

## General Summary for Thursday, 18 December, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 18 December, 2025

Scotland: South to south-west gales bringing hill fog and showers, before band of heavy, perhaps squally, rain moves up from the southwest in afternoon, snow tops.

England and Wales: Heavy rain spreading north with hill fog becoming extensive with strong to gale force southerly winds.

#### **Headline for Southern Uplands**

Southerly gales with showers easing, before heavy rain moves in from south.

# Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 18 December, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 30 to 50mph, speed likely to vary, possibly lessening further for a time during day.	
Effect of wind on you?	Changeable, but at times arduous walking conditions over exposed higher terrain, considerable wind chill.	
How wet?	Rain likely setting in afternoon	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy showers mostly Galloway, but often dry for a few hours. Then heavy rain moving in from southwest during afternoon, risk squally rain. Breaking up into showery rain and hail (snow high tops) evening into night.	
Cloud on the hills?	Varied, becoming extensive	
	Patchy cloud around some hills, mainly near Solway. Elsewhere may be clearer, but cloud lowering over hills widely in rain.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	40% dropping below 10%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast, varied layers of high cloud, but visibility good where dry, best in north; reducing if rain develops.	
How Cold? (at 750m)	3 or 4C, then lowering near 0C into night. Wind chill feeling as cold as -10C on tops.	
Freezing Level	Above the summits, then dropping into the night toward 800m or just above.

#### **Southern Uplands - Looking Ahead**

	Friday 19 December	Saturday 20 December
How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 45 to 60mph, may start to lessen a little.	South to south-easterly 20 to 30mph, but perhaps 40mph westernmost hills for a time.
Effect of wind on you?	Difficult conditions over higher hills, frequent buffeting from modest elevations upward. Significant wind chill.	A very blustery and gusty airflow, arduous towards west coast especially, with considerable buffeting and wind chill.
How wet?	Passing showers	Rain and drizzle mostly in west
(Precipitation and its impact)	Scattering of showers, most frequent Dumfries and Galloway, risk of hail. Often dry Borders.	As a front edges in from the west, rain and drizzle will likely become fairly widespread across hills near and west of the M74. Little if any in the east.
Cloud on the hills?	Occasionally on tops	Extensive in the west
	Patches of cloud drifting across higher tops, mostly above 700-800m. Often clear into the Borders and Pentland hills.	Cloud covering the hills fairly extensive across hills near and west of the M74.  Mainly just occasional caps of cloud over tops elsewhere.
Chance of cloud free summits?	60%	30% west, 70% east.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine most frequent east, cloudier Galloway. Visibility often very good, reduced in showers.	A little weak sun possible should cloud layers thin, mostly likely in the east. Visibility good or very good, but poor in any rain. General haze west coast.
How Cold? (at 750m)	2 or 3C. Feeling like -12C directly in the wind.	3 or 4C
Freezing Level	Just above highest summits.	Above the summits

## **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 19 December, 2025

South-southwesterly winds widely remain gale force over the mountains later this week and through into Saturday, severe upland gales for periods. Showery on Friday, most frequent in western Scotland with hail, also snow over tops. Another belt of persistent rain likely arrives onto western hills into Saturday, snow only highest Scottish tops. A switch to east-southeasterly winds by Sunday into early next week, some residual rain and high-level snow, but a drier theme develops and favouring chillier conditions into the Christmas period.

#### Forecast issued at 16:35 on Wednesday, 17 December, 2025
