
West Highlands

General Summary for Tuesday, 25 March, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 25 March, 2025

Fine weather for Scotland, sunshine best toward the south and east, chance of a brief shower northwest. Chilly breezes over higher terrain. A front clearing southwards over England & Wales brings a little rain and cloud covering the hills, but improving from the north.

Headline for West Highlands

Breezy on tops. Generally dry, broken cloud and sun.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 25 March, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	West to northwesterly 20 to 30mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Starting to affect balance where exposed on high summits and ridges. Marked wind chill.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Largely dry Chance of a brief light shower on coastal hills near/north of Mull in the morning, a snow flurry on highest slopes. Otherwise, remnants of overnight rain clearing before dawn to leave a dry day.	
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Occasional patches, lifting from most tops Patches of cloud come and go on higher slopes in the morning, mainly toward the coast above 800-900m. Lifting to be just rare patches above 1000m. 60%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of sun; sunshine best toward central highlands. Visibility excellent.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	2 to 4C. Wind chill feeling like -5 to -8C.	
Freezing Level	Near freezing above 1200m in the morning, lifting above highest summits. Patchy snow lying on highest terrain.

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southwesterly, strengthening 30 to 50mph, risk 60mph higher mountains later afternoon.	Southwesterly 35 to 45mph, at times 60mph on higher summits, particularly Ben Nevis range.
Effect of wind on you?	Deteriorating to make walking increasingly difficult on higher terrain, wind chill becoming significant.	Strenuous walking, balance often affected on exposed tops and ridges, frequent buffeting. Significant wind chill.
How wet?	Risk rain later	Rain setting in, soonest west Lochaber
(Precipitation and its impact)	Dry possibly until well into afternoon; spots of rain developing, then later in the day risk of more persistent rain moving in from the west, mainly Lochaber.	Rain becoming persistent near and west of Loch Linnhe, starting as snow flurries on the Munros, turning to sleet or rain toward tops; heavier with time. Less rain Loch Lomond to Arran, may turn wetter later.
Cloud on the hills?	Varied patches, filling in later	Increasingly extensive
	Banks of cloud on some slopes in the morning, higher tops may be above cloud for a time. Patchy cloud lifting onto higher tops, some clearer breaks inland. Later thickening from west to become extensive.	Covering most mountains all day, may vary in the morning, some breaks possible, above 900m well inland. Likely lowering to increasingly shroud hills, to lower slopes coastal areas, 600-700m inland.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	60% dropping to 20% later Lochaber.	30% dropping below 10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, a little sun through high cloud occasionally. Visibility very good, reducing later in rain.	Any weak patchy sun giving way to thickening cloud cover. Visibility initially good, mainly inland/south, becoming hazier; poor in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	1 to 4C. Wind chill feeling like -10C, nearer -15C as speeds increase.	1C rising to 3C. Wind chill feeling like -10C, to -15C on higher tops.
Freezing Level	Close to freezing some higher slopes above 900m at dawn; otherwise above the summits.	1000m early morning, rising to 1200m or above into afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 26 March, 2025

Westerly winds prevailing from midweek through to the weekend - often gale force over the mountains, particularly Scotland. Spells of rain, most persistent in western Scotland. Temperatures near or just above freezing on Scottish tops midweek, then widely chillier by Friday into the weekend - sub-zero on all hills above 800m, with showers of snow on hills and sometimes hail. An improving trend by Sunday into early next week high pressure starts to rebuild, bringing dry weather and lighter winds for most places.
