
West Highlands

Western Highlands accessible from, and south of, Glenfinnan (Road to the Isles) and Glen Spean (includes Creag Meagaidh). This area includes Ben Nevis and the mountains around Glencoe. In the east, from Ben Alder south to Loch Lomond and Trossachs NP. Also Arran and Mull.



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General Summary for Tuesday, 23 December, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 23 December, 2025

A fairly extensive sheet of cloud cloaks eastern Scotland southward down the Pennines and east Wales; some mist and haze, fine drizzle on eastern slopes. Cloud more broken on slopes and summits near west coasts, substantially dry here. An easterly wind south Pennines and Wales, strengthening into night.

Headline for West Highlands

Often cloudy towards central highlands, spots of light rain

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 23 December, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Variable, generally southeasterly 15-20mph, though lighter winds northern Lochaber.	
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, local lulls in Lochaber, though some uncomfortable gusty spots possible towards Lochaber.	
How wet?	A little rain on and off	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Some patchy light rain here and there but totals will be small, many slopes likely remain dry.	
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive central highlands, variable northwest	
	Fairly extensive over high terrain from Loch Lomond north to Creag Meagaidh, bases to 700m, locally lower where rain and drizzle occur. Some lower banks too including patchy fog in the glens. More variable inland Lochaber, some breaks.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy. Good visibility in places, but variable as rain comes and goes, hazier or mistier further toward the central belt.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	3 to 5C, some variability, always warmest Lochaber; little change with added height; trending cooler later.	
Freezing Level	Above the summits, may lower to just touch high summits of the central highlands into nighttime.

Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small	Fairly small, though turbulent at all elevations, may become uncomfortable on southern mountains.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly mid-slopes south and east	Patches on middle slopes
	Cloud banks cling to the hills between 800-1100m from Glencoe to the southern islands, bases variable and may lower near Loch Lomond. Patchier further west and north, many coastal slopes Mull and north clear.	Patchy cloud forming on middle slopes, most frequently near Loch Lomond and Glencoe. Patches well scattered towards Lochaber, many hills clear here.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	60%	80% (tops above cloud layer)
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Best of sunshine in coastal Lochaber, patchier sun near Glencoe/Loch Lomond. Very good visibility though a slight haze.	Patchy sunshine, best in Lochaber where may be fairly extensive. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	-1 or 0C towards the central highlands, several degrees warmer west towards the coast, locally up to 3C.	-2C, a slight rise in temperature with added height; also a degree warmer coastal slopes.
Freezing Level	Poorly defined, around 700-800m Loch Lomond to east Glencoe; higher or above the summits to the west.	Poorly defined: many slopes above 700m at or below freezing, though milder western slopes and on the highest tops.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 24 December, 2025

Christmas Eve and Christmas Day will be dry: easterly winds are dominant with the strongest winds in England and Wales. Cloud may be fairly sheet-like in the east sometimes, though variably more extensive or broken, best of breaks in western areas. Turning colder too, the coldest air in England and Wales with freezing levels reaching as low as 400-600m in east Wales. Staying slightly warmer in northern Scotland with some inversion conditions likely over higher terrain; frost into glens and poorly defined freezing levels.

High pressure stays put to the north into the weekend, maintaining dry weather, easterly winds, and most cloud in eastern areas. Temperatures will stay chilly.
