


Yorkshire Dales and North Pennines

The entire Yorkshire Dales National Park and North Pennines AONB, including the Three Peaks and Cross Fell, also south to Forest of Bowland and Ilkley Moor.



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General Summary for Friday, 27 March, 2020



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 27 March, 2020

The remnants of a front will continue to bring dull hazy weather across much of Scotland, although the NW Highlands extensively fine with very clear air. Extensive sunshine England and Wales, though increasingly blustery.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales and North Pennines

Hazy sunshine; fairly light wind.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 27 March, 2020

How windy? (On the summits)	Northeasterly 15-20mph, may increase to 25mph through afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain
Cloud on the hills?	Small risk cloud enveloping northern Pennines Very likely summits cloud free all day. However, small risk patches of low cloud, base 500 to 700m edging south onto higher northern Pennines.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Greater than 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sun although hazy.
How Cold? (at 700m)	3C.
And in the valleys	Frost some valleys at dawn; rising to 8 to 11C, highest western dales.

Yorkshire Dales and North Pennines - Looking Ahead

	Saturday 28 March	Sunday 29 March
How windy? (On the summits)	Northeasterly 30mph, may strengthen to 35mph toward evening.	North or northeasterly 30mph, probably gradually easing toward 20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking frequently arduous on higher areas and wind chill significant.	Will impede walking on higher areas, particularly morning
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Isolated flurries Risk of a few brief flurries of hail.	Precipitation very unlikely Risk isolated very brief hail flurries.
Cloud on the hills?	Summits soon cloud free Some uncertainty in the extent of cloud covering higher slopes after dawn. The base will lift and by late morning, possibly midday, all summits will be cloud free.	Not expected
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patches of bright sunshine and excellent visibility.	Sunshine will become occasional as cloud progressively fills in. Superb visibility.
How Cold? (at 700m)	1C.	-3C rising to 1C
And in the valleys	After risk of frost in a few western valleys at dawn, will reach 8 to 10C early afternoon, warmest western dales.	Terrain frozen or partly frozen from valleys up after frost at dawn. Will rise to 7 to 9C in the afternoon.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 28 March, 2020**

Frequently cold over the next week, leaving higher terrain in Scotland frozen and intermittently frozen elsewhere. Precipitation amounts very small, although a few hail flurries, mainly N Scotland.
