

## General Summary for Thursday, 23 January, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 23 January, 2025

The onset of a change as air begins to come in off the Atlantic. There will be extensive low cloud, and as a weakening front comes inland precipitation (snow on the mountains, even lower slopes Scotland) will set in for a couple of hours or so (very little N/NE Scotland). Upland winds will also strengthen markedly.

#### **Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines**

Snow/rain after dry start. Becoming windy.

## Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 23 January, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly; from west morning/middle of day strengthening 25mph, perhaps 35mph higher tops. Will abruptly veer westerly afternoon.		
Effect of wind on you?	Where exposed walking becoming arduous on higher areas and wind chill considerable.		
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and upland snow spreading east Local showers morning, but extensively dry. A couple of hours of rain or snow above 450m middle of day/early afternoon.		
Cloud on the hills?	Very extensive Cloud will cover most mountains more or less all day, although some higher slopes may be cloud free at times morning. The cloud base often very low, typically 200 to 500m.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	Less than 10%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Soon cloudy: early glimpses of sun before high cloud thickens. Visibility good but poor in rain, sometimes appalling in snow.		
How Cold? (at 700m)	0C. Will feel as cold as minus -10C directly in the wind.		
And in the valleys	Will reach around 5C in afternoon.

How Cold? (at 700m)	2C, In afternoon dropping erratically to -2C. Will feel as cold as minus 18C directly in	-1C. Will feel as cold as minus 14C directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	7C to briefly 10C in morning, then lowering to 5C during afternoon, colder from dusk.	Will reach 4 or 5C early afternoon.

## **Planning Outlook**

## All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 24 January, 2025

An extremely intense Atlantic low will make landfall in Scotland on Friday. In many areas upland winds will approach or reach hurricane force, and widespread precipitation will occur.

Precipitation will then fall most days over the coming week as low pressure continues to dominate, giving further periods of upland gales or storm force winds. On the Scottish Highlands most precipitation will be of snow, whilst further south snow more intermittently and often confined to higher summits.
