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
Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

The entire Yorkshire Dales National Park and North Pennines AONB, including the Three Peaks and Cross Fell, plus Howgills, also south to Forest of Bowland.



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General Summary for Tuesday, 24 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 24 June, 2025

Frequent rain/drizzle onto most west coastal slopes, steadier rain for a time in the morning slipping east. High terrain mostly foggy, down to lower slopes in places along west coasts; best of breaks east Scotland and North Pennines. Blustery for most with risk of gales high terrain of England and north Wales.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Patchy rain, at times frequent west; very blustery

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 24 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 30 to 35mph. Strongest sustained winds during the afternoon may reach up to 40mph at times on highest terrain.	
Effect of wind on you?	Very blustery over the fells, strenuous to arduous walking where exposed on high tops in strongest winds. Considerable wind chill.	
How wet?	Fairly persistent western fells, easing later	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and drizzle fairly persistent, mostly western Yorks Dales NP. Steadier rain for several hours through the morning. Fading to drizzly showers later, less toward east.	
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive	
	Covering higher areas most or all day, may persist to mid-slopes western Yorks Dales. Some breaks above 600-700m eastwards. Best chance of breaks above tops in the eastern North Pennines.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%, 40% N Pennines	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, glimpses of sun best in east. Visibility excellent below cloud away from rain.	
How Cold? (at 700m)	10 or 11C, little change all day. Easternmost Dales may rise a degree or two where sun is most frequent. Feeling near freezing in the wind.	
And in the valleys	11C at dawn, rising to 15 to 17C, warmest eastern dales.	

Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 25 June	Thursday 26 June
How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly, shifting southwesterly, 15 to 20mph, at times 25mph over higher slopes.	Westerly 25-30mph. Shifting southwesterly into night and increasing to 40mph+.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.	Walking impeded in strongest winds, becoming arduous into evening. Marked wind chill.
How wet?	Drizzle west Dales, risk wetter later	Rain early, then dry
(Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzly spots over western Yorks Dales NP in the morning, occasional drizzly showers further north as well. Toward evening, more persistent rain likely to develop from southwest.	Often raining for a few hours around dawn, then substantially dry. Some fine drizzle may linger on high westernmost slopes for a short time.
Cloud on the hills?	Lowest and most persistent west Dales	Fairly extensive early, clearing summits
	Shrouding Three Peaks area up to Tebay possibly most of the day, from mid-slopes upward in morning at least. Higher cloud base eastern Dales and north of Kirkby Stephen, regularly lifting above tops. Becoming extensive into evening.	Quite extensive over high terrain at dawn, down to lowest slopes in western Yorkshire Dales. Breaking through morning for largely cloud-free fells. A few passing caps may drift over the tops of the Three Peaks at times.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40%, 60% east Dales.	Becoming above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun mainly north and east Pennines. Visibility good out of cloud, very good northeast.	Gradually becoming mostly sunny through morning. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 700m)	9C rising to 13C.	11C, locally slightly warmer easternmost Dales. Cooling to 9C by afternoon. Feeling near or just above freezing in wind.
And in the valleys	12C at dawn, rising to 20C afternoon.	12C at dawn, rising to 15C for a time. Western-aspect valleys likely variable between these temperatures afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 25 June, 2025

West to southwesterly winds prevail this week and a series of frontal systems come in from the Atlantic. Rain and drizzle most frequent in west with low cloud often covering hills, typically most extensive in Scotland. Higher cloud bases and drier further eastwards. Temperatures near average, or lower at times in Scotland. Often windy, risk of more extensive upland gales and some heavier rain as deeper areas of low pressure likely move in later in the week. Some indication of a brief settled spell into the weekend and rising temperatures, though northwest Scotland remaining at risk of frontal weather systems.
