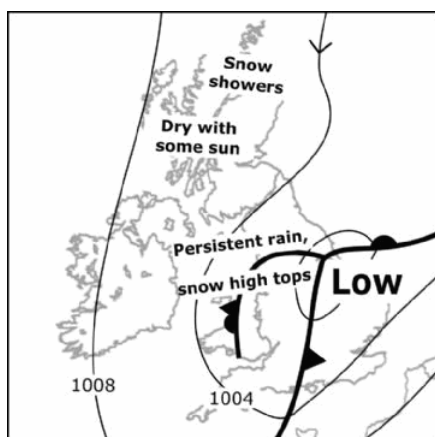

General Summary for Saturday, 29 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 29 November, 2025

Snow showers toward northern Scotland, but much of the Highlands will be dry - sunshine and cloud breaks best toward southwest; sub-zero on tops, chilly northerly breeze. England and Wales sees rain fairly widely, snow falling on higher tops; wind very variable, but risk gales developing.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Risk of increasing wind, developing heavier rain, snow tops.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 29 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Some uncertainty remains as a complex weather system moves slowly: A possible lull to low speeds, but risk rapidly becoming northeasterly 30-40mph, mainly during the afternoon, soonest north.
Effect of wind on you?	Likely small for a time, but be aware of possibly worsening conditions during the daytime, quickly bringing more challenging walking and significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and hill snow increasingly setting in Patchy rain likely to affect the region from dawn, locally drier for a time. More persistent rain likely develops, and snow level tending to fall to 700m, perhaps 500m by dusk onward, risk heavy.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive Likely to shroud the higher fells throughout the day, most extensive to mid-slopes during constant precipitation. Occasional breaks may form, mainly southern areas.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Generally overcast and dull. Poor visibility in rain, very poor in snow on tops; locally may improve occasionally.
How Cold? (at 700m)	1C, falling from north in afternoon to -1C. Feeling near -10C if exposed to stronger wind.
And in the valleys	4 to 6C, tending to drop colder from north during afternoon.

	Sunday 30 November	Monday 1 December
How windy? (On the summits)	N-NW'ly 25 to 35mph early morning, easing gradually, W'ly 15mph afternoon. Increasing into night S'ly 40-50mph.	Some uncertainty: Southerly 35 to 50mph, may vary during day, possibly briefly lower speeds.
Effect of wind on you?	Considerable wind chill and buffeting in exposure early in day, lessening into afternoon. Deteriorating into night.	Expect challenging conditions most of the day, walking often difficult on higher terrain; significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Risk early snow flurries, then dry Possibility of overnight hill snow, rain lower slopes, risk heavier for a time; likely to fade to flurries by dawn, clearing eastward to become generally dry.	Risk persistent often heavy rain Rain from overnight likely briefly eases up to dawn, a few hours may be drier, but soon further rain likely, risk setting in for sustained heavy falls, particularly in west.
Cloud on the hills?	Areas of cloud mostly north and east Cloud banks may regularly drift over higher North Pennines and high tops elsewhere for a few hours at least. Tending to break up into afternoon, clearest western Dales.	Most persistent west, higher northeast Shrouding higher terrain most of day, lowest cloud base western Yorks Dales up to Tebay, often to mid-slopes. Some breaks above 700m northeastern Pennines, but extensively lowering in rain.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50% rising to 80%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy early in day, visibility poor if snow occurs. Sun breaking through soonest in west, visibility then excellent.	Largely overcast, dull in rain. Often poor visibility in west, widely in rain, locally better at times in east.
How Cold? (at 700m) And in the valleys	0 or -1C, small variation with height in the morning. Feeling near -10C if exposed to strongest wind. Near freezing from dawn, rising to max 3 or 4C early afternoon.	4C rising to 7C. Wind chill feeling like -7 to -10C in exposure on higher tops. 6C at dawn, rising to 10C.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 30 November, 2025

After a lull on Sunday, areas of low pressure then circulating to the west and north will dominate the weather pattern into next week, bringing generally unsettled weather. Southwesterly air and briefly milder into Monday, with rain for most places at times, but prolonged heavier rain for England and Wales. Then typically cooler with showery conditions - higher mountains near or just below freezing point likely for the remainder of the week - some snow on tops, occasional hail. Wind speed likely to vary, some squally gusty spells, but also some lulls possible during the week ahead.
