

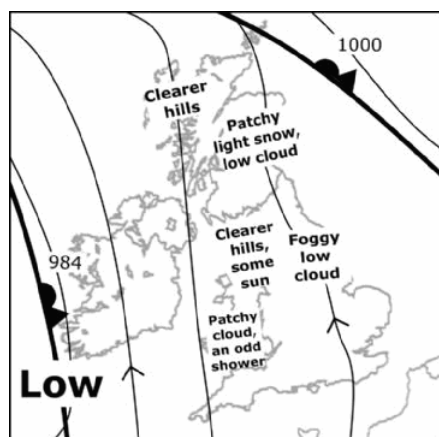

General Summary for Wednesday, 28 January, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 28 January, 2026

A fairly quiet day with plenty of dry weather and some good cloud breaks toward the west and northwest of major hill groups. Some snow flurries and low cloud lingers over the Cairngorms to SE Highlands. Moderate S-SE wind, locally gusty.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Low cloud / fog mainly east, clearer hills further west.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 28 January, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southeasterly 10 to 15mph, lowest in morning, tending to increase a little with time toward 20mph afternoon in places, some gusts mainly toward west.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Damp air locally Generally dry, but some fine drizzle where in cloud, snow grains some higher tops.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly southeast, clearer west Some cloud banks around higher slopes, most persistent in the east and southeastern Yorks Dales NP, including mist to some lower slopes in morning. Good breaks west and northwest. Low cloud spills back across most eastern areas onward into evening.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% southeast Yorks Dales, to 60% north and western areas.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Variable cloud, occasional sun, mainly in west where visibility mostly very good. Furthest east, may remain cloudy or misty to some lower elevations.
How Cold? (at 700m)	1 or 2C.
And in the valleys	2C rising to 5C afternoon.

	Thursday 29 January	Friday 30 January
How windy? (On the summits)	East to southeasterly 20 to 30mph, gusty around higher exposed summits and locally west of Pennines.	Southeasterly 25 to 35mph, strongest sustained speeds higher N Pennines, but gusty around high tops elsewhere.
Effect of wind on you?	Strenuous walking on some higher areas, varied and smaller some more sheltered ground. Considerable wind chill.	Affecting comfortable walking over exposed terrain, some buffeting gusts not just on tops. Significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Snow flurries Mostly light snow flurries, most common eastern side of Pennines, patchy westward; sleet or rain below 400-500m.	Patchy hill snow and rain Intermittent snow above 400-500m, later 600m, rain lower down; locally more persistent toward south and east.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive Cloud banks drifting over tops above 500 to 600m, risk a more extensive sheet across eastern moors in particular.	Fairly extensive Shrouding most high terrain, lowest and most persistent cloud over south and eastern areas.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, hazy particularly in east, better visibility westward.	Generally cloudy, poor visibility most areas, whiteout if in fog and snow on tops. Locally better toward Vale of Eden.
How Cold? (at 700m)	0 or -1C. Wind chill feeling like -8 to -10C.	-1 or -2C, rising gradually to around 0C. Wind chill feeling around -10C, to -13C highest N Pennines tops.
And in the valleys	3 to 5C, small change night into day.	2C from dawn, rising to 4 or 5C afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 29 January, 2026

Slow-moving weather patterns and a broadly similar regime to recent times over the next week or so. Scottish mountains generally below freezing point, with snow cover and drifts most substantial from the Cairngorms to central and southern Highlands, some additional falls in the week ahead, much less northwestward. Hills in England and Wales will see varying freezing levels, sub-zero for periods to 600m or lower, but intermittently lifting just above the tops - a mix of rain and upland snowfall. Wind speed will vary, some periods of lower speeds than recently, though gusty SE'ly winds remain common in the Highlands. Scope for widely colder conditions toward mid February.
