

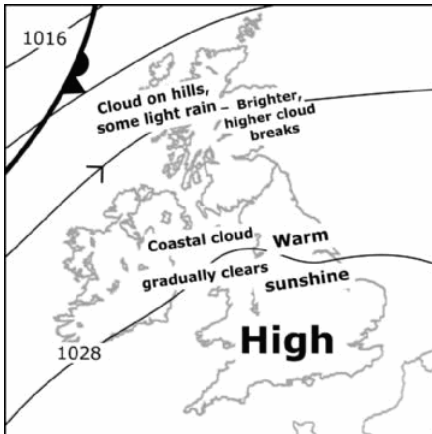
Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

The entire Yorkshire Dales National Park and North Pennines AONB, including the Three Peaks and Cross Fell, plus Howgills, also south to Forest of Bowland.



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General Summary for Saturday, 23 May, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 23 May, 2026

Scotland: Gusty south-westerly will feed extensive low cloud and patchy drizzle into the west. Mostly dry for eastern hills where cloud will lift and break off the hills.

England and Wales: Low cloud and local drizzle morning western hills, mainly coasts, but burning off to leave warm sunshine widely.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Breezy. May be a slow start west, patchy low cloud, but dispersing to sunshine.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 23 May, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 15-20mph, some gustiness early and late in the day.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Likely entirely dry Some fine misty drizzle may affect high Three Peaks summits and perhaps towards Tebay, this soon fading after sunrise for dry fells.
Cloud on the hills?	Early cloud largely clears May be fairly extensive on western high fells from dawn, lowest bases near 300-400m Wharfedale to Tebay. Lifting through morning and likely breaking, east fells clear; may linger into midday on high west summits.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Becoming mostly sunny as cloud breaks, some thin high cloud builds later. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 700m)	9 or 10C, rising to 14 or 15C. Only slight drop Yorks Dales NP into night.
And in the valleys	10C at dawn, rising to 19 or 20C, mildest eastern Yorks Dales NP.

Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines - Looking Ahead

	Sunday 24 May	Monday 25 May
How windy? (On the summits)	South to south-westerly 10 to 20mph	South-westerly 10 to 20mph, generally strongest in the morning when perhaps briefly touching 25mph over northern tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Small	Mostly small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Dry	Dry
Cloud on the hills?	Very little Aside from some patches of banks across coastal hills early in morning, which will burn off, hills are expected to be clear.	Soon all hills clear From dawn, some patches at varying heights, but they will soon lift and disperse to leave the hills clear of cloud.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine coming through. Very good visibility.	Extensive sunshine. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 700m)	Lifting to 16 or 17C, very warm	17C, humid
And in the valleys	Valley temperature topping out at 23 to 26C, highest eastern and southern valleys.	Increasingly very warm with valley temperatures reaching 24 to 26C.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 24 May, 2026**

Pressure builds this weekend, centred over England and Wales where it will be warm and sunny. To the north of the high, a blustery and gusty south-westerly will persist across the Highlands with patchy rain and hill fog, mainly in the west and northwest. Very warm by Sunday and Monday valleys of Wales and England, mid to high 20s. Low 20s glens into southern and eastern Scotland. Next week, high pressure extends over Scotland, cutting of the low cloud and drizzle from northwest Scotland by midweek with warm sunny weather, cooler in the north and east coast. Still very warm into the valleys of England and Wales with extensive sunshine.
