

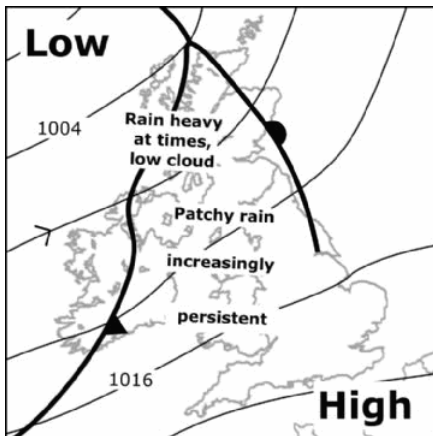
# Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

## General Summary for Sunday, 7 June, 2026



### British Mountain Summary:

**Based on forecast chart for noon 7 June, 2026**

Scotland: Strong and gusty south-westerly winds will drive hill fog and frequent rainfall across western mountains, setting in during afternoon. Rainfall patchier across eastern hills with higher bases.  
 England and Wales: Windy with patchy light rain onto western hills, becoming more widely damp or wet through the day.

### Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Windy, with a little patchy rain, more substantial later in afternoon.

## Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 7 June, 2026

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Southwesterly 25-35mph, gusty over tops particularly early. Deteriorating, greatest risk north, sustained speeds 35-40mph.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Ease of walking always impacted, increasingly strenuous over the tops with notable wind chill, strongest effects north.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Some light rain, may deteriorate</b> Patchy light rain drifting onto western fells from time to time, many dry windows in the morning, especially in east. Later in day, drizzly rain more widely onto western Dales and N Pennines.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Caps may linger on northern tops</b> May be fairly extensive from 500m up early hours, lowest bases from Tebay southward. Rising with time, likely clearing Yorks Dales NP summits, and maybe N Pennines too, but caps may just graze Cross Fell group at times.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>Rising to 70%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine in the morning will be weakened by high cloud, turning overcast. Very good visibility, but some haze western dales.
<b>How Cold? (at 700m)</b>	8 or 9C rising to 11C. Feeling near freezing in strongest wind.
<b>And in the valleys</b>	7C at dawn, rising to 16C.

## Yorkshire Dales &amp; North Pennines - Looking Ahead

	Monday 8 June	Tuesday 9 June
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Southwesterly 15 to 25mph.	South-westerly 15 to 25mph, may reach 30mph at times tops in the afternoon.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Fairly small effect on walking, but feeling blustery and a noticeable chill on exposed high terrain.</b>	<b>May impede walking at times over the tops in the afternoon, with a marked wind chill.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Rain then showers</b> A band of rain clears eastward from dawn into early morning, briefly heavy. Then a scattering of showers, risk some heavier later in day.	<b>Showers becoming widespread</b> Showers at first, concentrated in the west, but becoming widespread across the area. Some hail possible, with the risk of thunder too.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Breaks to tops</b> Varied cloud banks mostly western hills and higher tops in morning, lifting higher up with breaks away from showers.	<b>Occasional over tops; but frequent west.</b> Bases varying with showery environment, but cover the tops occasionally in fog. Most frequently western hills, where in morning may be down to 500m for a time.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>50%</b>	<b>40% west, 70% east.</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sun, mainly eastern hills. Visibility good away from showers and below cloud.	Often cloudy, patchy sun best in the east.  Visibility sometimes poor due to rain.
<b>How Cold? (at 700m)</b>	6 or 7C. Feeling below freezing directly in the wind.	4 lifting to 6C
<b>And in the valleys</b>	10C at dawn, rising to 14C afternoon, but always a little cooler in rain.	Temperatures lifting to highs of 13C

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 8 June, 2026**

The unsettled period of weather will persist over the coming week with low pressure area centres tracking just to the northwest of Scotland, allowing south-westerly winds to prevail. Rainfall often showery in nature, but coming in frequently to western mountains with the greatest falls for western Scotland. Chilly and windy at times; freezing level touching highest tops Scotland on Tuesday and Wednesday, when showers will fall as snow over the tops. Temperatures trending milder again next weekend, pressure may begin to rise in the south to give drier weather more widely.
