

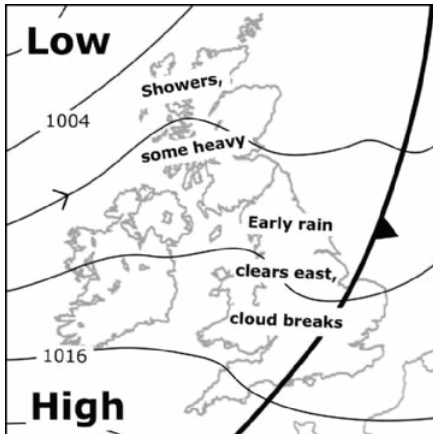
# Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

The entire Yorkshire Dales National Park and North Pennines AONB, including the Three Peaks and Cross Fell, plus Howgills, also south to Forest of Bowland.



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## General Summary for Monday, 8 June, 2026



### British Mountain Summary:

**Based on forecast chart for noon 8 June, 2026**

Early rain across England and Wales, and perhaps eastern Scotland, soon clears eastwards. Following on, a south-westerly with scattered showers: risk of afternoon thundery ones northeast Scotland. Fewer showers and turning much brighter for England and Wales with hills becoming mostly clear.

### Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Early rain clears, then much brighter with patchy sun, and isolated showers.

## Detailed Forecast for Monday, 8 June, 2026

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	South-westerly soon westerly 15 to 25mph, but briefly up to 30mph early in the morning.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	Fairly small effect on walking, but feeling blustery and a noticeable chill on exposed high terrain.
<b>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</b>	<b>Early rain clears, then mostly dry.</b> A band of rain, heavy for a time, clears eastward mostly by mid morning. Then as with a ridge of high pressure following in, it will remain very likely dry through much of the day. Some evening showers.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Clearing hills</b> Banks of low cloud from dawn, down to 300-500m, may linger to mid morning, but as rain clears, bases will lift and breaks up markedly, with cloud lifting off hills. Then hills clear through day.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>30% lifting to 90%</b>
<b>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</b>	Overcast start, cloud breaking to reveal spells of sunshine. Visibility poor in early rain, but becoming mostly very good.
<b>How Cold? (at 700m)</b>	6 or 7C. Feeling below freezing directly in the wind.
<b>And in the valleys</b>	10C at dawn, rising to 14C afternoon, but always a little cooler in rain.

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	South-westerly 15 to 25mph, may reach 30mph at times tops in the afternoon.	Westerly 15 to 20mph
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>May impede walking at times over the tops in the afternoon, with a marked wind chill.</b>	<b>Fairly small, but noticeable chill factor, despite the modest breeze.</b>
<b>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</b>	<b>Showers becoming widespread</b> Showers at first, concentrated in the west, but becoming widespread across the area. Some hail possible, with the risk of thunder too.	<b>Showers forming widely, risk thunder</b> Showers initially near to west coast. These will move inland and develop from mid morning. By afternoon, widely showery, some heavy; hail and thunder.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Occasional over tops; but frequent west.</b> Bases varying with showery environment, but cover the tops occasionally in fog. Most frequently western hills, where in morning may be down to 500m for a time.	<b>Patches over tops in rain.</b> Varied bases. At first, banks over western tops, elsewhere mostly clear. As showers develop widely, expect patches or banks to form at times over the tops.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>40% west, 70% east.</b>	<b>60%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Often cloudy, patchy sun best in the east. Visibility sometimes poor due to rain.	Variable cloud and patchy sun, best sun early in day well inland. Visibility mostly good, but poor in showers.
<b>How Cold? (at 700m)</b>	4 lifting to 6C	4C lifting to 6C
<b>And in the valleys</b>	Temperatures lifting to highs of 13C	Valley temperature lifting to highs of 13 or 14C

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 9 June, 2026**

The unsettled period of weather will persist over the coming week with low pressure area centres tracking just to the northwest of Scotland, allowing south-westerly winds to prevail. Rainfall often showery in nature, but coming in frequently to western mountains with the greatest falls for western Scotland. Chilly and windy at times; freezing level touching highest tops Scotland on Tuesday and Wednesday, when showers may fall as wet snow at times over the tops. Temperatures trending warmer again next weekend, as pressure is likely to rise from the south to give drier weather more widely.
