

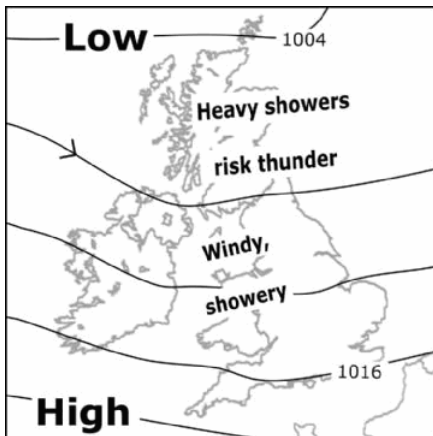
Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

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General Summary for Tuesday, 9 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 9 June, 2026

Generally showery, heavy bursts with risk of thunder, particularly more eastern areas afternoon into evening. Strongest west to southwesterly winds for England and Wales. Rather chilly, notable wind chill in exposure on hills. Cloud varying over the tops.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Cool, increasingly windy; heavy showers spreading east.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 9 June, 2026

<p>How windy? (On the summits)</p> <p>Effect of wind on you?</p>	<p>Southwesterly 20 to 25mph in the morning, stronger gusts develop near showers, then shifting westerly during afternoon, rising to 30mph, gusts 35-40mph for a few hours into early evening.</p> <p>Blustery, increasingly impeding ease of walking over the tops into the afternoon, more challenging buffeting gusts onward into early evening. Considerable wind chill.</p>
<p>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</p>	<p>Showers becoming widespread, risk of lightning.</p> <p>Showers at first concentrated in the west, but becoming widespread across the area, during afternoon into evening most heavier showers moving toward east. Some hail possible, with the risk of thunder too.</p>
<p>Cloud on the hills?</p> <p>Chance of cloud free summits?</p>	<p>Occasional over tops</p> <p>Bases varying with showery environment, but patchy cloud sometimes capping higher slopes. Most frequently western hills, where in morning may be down to 500m for a time, soon rising.</p> <p>60% west, 80% east.</p>
<p>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</p>	<p>Often cloudy, patchy sun best in the east in morning. By evening, some sun may break through in west.</p> <p>Visibility sometimes poor due to rain, intermittently very good.</p>
<p>How Cold? (at 700m)</p> <p>And in the valleys</p>	<p>4C lifting to 6C. Feeling like -5C directly in the wind.</p> <p>9C at dawn, rising to max 13C in afternoon, but a few degrees lower in showers.</p>

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly 15 to 20mph, tending to rise during afternoon, later 25-30mph over higher fells into evening. Fairly small in morning, more noticeably blustery with time, marked wind chill where exposed to the strongest breeze.	Southerly turning west-southwesterly later, 25 to 35mph, gusty 40mph at times. Blustery over higher terrain, at times affecting ease of walking and balance on exposed tops. Considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers moving east, risk thunder Showers initially western hills. These develop more widely eastward from mid morning. By afternoon, widely showery, some heavy; hail and thunder, later mainly toward east. Fading from west to leave odd light showers in evening.	Persistent rain Rain arriving from before dawn in west, some steadier heavier falls for periods through the morning. May break up a little in afternoon, but still often raining.
Cloud on the hills?	Patches over tops in rain Varied bases. At first, banks over western tops, elsewhere mostly clear. As showers develop widely, expect patches or banks to form at times over the tops.	Extensive low cloud Soon blanket low cloud across the fells, to lower slopes western dales, fairly extensive above 600m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	60%	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Variable cloud and patchy sun, best sun early in day eastern dales. Visibility mostly good, but poor in showers.	Overcast and dull, murky southwest. Poor visibility much of day in rain.
How Cold? (at 700m) And in the valleys	4C lifting to 6C. Feeling below freezing in the stronger breeze. 7C at dawn, lifting to highs of 13 or 14C afternoon, but dropping a few degrees in showers.	5C rising to 9C. Feeling like 0 to -5C directly in wind. 9C at dawn rising to 13C afternoon, or slightly milder toward evening.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 10 June, 2026

A changeable pattern continues this week with west-southwesterly winds prevailing, bringing a mix of rain and showers in from the Atlantic. A period of more persistent rain on Thursday. Pressure tends to rise from the south toward the weekend, bringing warmer air and drier conditions particularly England & Wales, although western mountains will remain often cloudy, some patchy rain remaining in west and northwest Scotland into the weekend. Into next week, a mixed southwesterly pattern remains possible, with some rain, drizzle and low cloud mostly in the west, but with higher pressure trying to expand northward, the week looks generally drier and warmer than the present time.
