

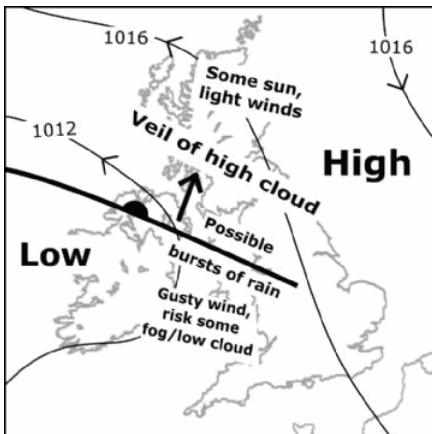
Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

The entire Yorkshire Dales National Park and North Pennines AONB, including the Three Peaks and Cross Fell, plus Howgills, also south to Forest of Bowland.



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General Summary for Monday, 15 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 15 June, 2026

A largely dry day for the Highlands, light winds inland and north, some sun, but a layer of cloud increasingly covers the sky from the south, later some rain moving into coastal areas. A little rain for northern England and Wales, locally risk of a heavier burst of rain forming. Gusty southerly winds particularly Wales.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Light wind freshens. Cloud lifts, some patchy rain later.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 15 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Easterly or variable 10mph or less at dawn. Then southeasterly 10-15mph gradually strengthening, approaching 20mph into evening, gusts 25-30mph from sunset.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small until late in day.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain later The morning is dry, then patchy rain approaches from the southwest through afternoon, falls light with continued dry windows. Odd heavier moments may occur into evening. Rain may only reach North Pennines near sunset.
Cloud on the hills?	Early low cloud east clears Fairly extensive across northeast areas at dawn, perhaps below the highest tops in N Pennines. Cloud will lift in the morning to shroud the tops briefly, but all cloud clears above the summits by midday.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mixed cloud and weak sun morning, best sun west, high cloud thickening. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 700m)	8C rising to 11 or 12C; locally cooler eastern North Pennines.
And in the valleys	5C at dawn, rising to 15C east, or 17C western Dales.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 15mph early, gradually rising, reaching 25mph afternoon-evening, some stronger gusts Fairly small, but increasingly blustery, ease of walking widely impacted later with a chilly feeling.	Southwesterly 25 to 30mph, some stronger gusts around high tops, more often over higher North Pennines. Blustery over the fells, strenuous walking in exposure on higher slopes, more frequent buffeting North Pennines.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Substantially dry until later A few patches of light rain drift over the fells from time to time, notably early, but then dry well into the afternoon, but later a risk of more frequent rain, may set in for several hours evening onward.	Rain may persist, then fading A mix of rain, drizzle and some showery moments; the most frequent rain typically western Yorks Dales up to Tebay, risk persistently wet over several hours. Tending to fade through afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	High terrain stays shrouded Extensive to at least middle slopes from dawn, to the lower slopes near and south of Tebay. A rising tendency towards 700m, some fleeing higher breaks possible midday/afternoon, but returning more extensively later.	Lowest and most persistent west Blanket cloud across the fells around rain, from low-mid slopes upward western Yorks Dales and Howgills. Tending to rise afternoon, but often capping western tops. Lifting above 600m north/east, some breaks.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	20% west, rising to 50% north/east
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, a few brighter moments afternoon. Very good visibility where out of cloud.	Largely cloudy, some sun may break through afternoon. Hazy or misty around rain in west, then visibility improves later to be very good.
How Cold? (at 700m) And in the valleys	10C rising to 12 or 13C; slightly cooler toward evening. Feeling like 5C in strongest direct wind. 9C at dawn, rising to 16C, or milder east Yorks Dales.	10 or 11C, little change all day. Feeling near to freezing directly in wind. 12C at dawn, rising to 18C afternoon.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 16 June, 2026**

A variable southwesterly will dominate through mid to late this week - windy at times with periods of rain, drizzle and low cloud most persistent in the west. Pressure generally trending higher from the south by the weekend, though into Saturday at least a damp westerly likely prevails into western Scotland. Warmest in England and Wales, but cooler in Scotland as low pressure to the northwest recycles air from the north Atlantic back onto the Munros. A window of drier and warmer weather is favoured into early the following week (22nd June), though a mixed Atlantic pattern may linger near to northwest Scotland in the longer range.
