

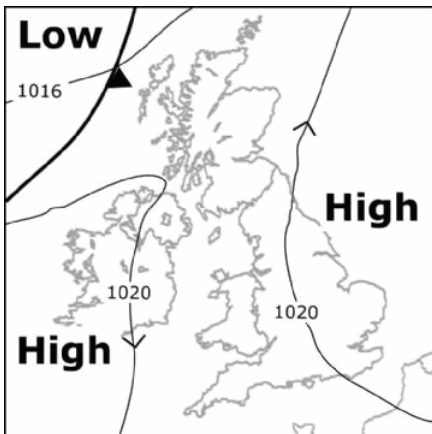
Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

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General Summary for Tuesday, 23 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 23 June, 2026

Becoming very warm and humid, particularly Wales where exceptionally so. Chillier north and west of Scotland, especially near the coast where it will become drizzly and misty. Elsewhere, be aware of dehydration and sunburn..

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Becoming very warm indeed. Extensive sunshine.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 23 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 10 to perhaps 15mph on highest tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely Chance of an isolated thundery shower at first.
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any Fog here and there after dawn - clearing within a few hours
Chance of cloud free summits?	Soon almost certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine extensive, perhaps sometimes weak due to thin high level cloud. Good visibility although hazy.
How Cold? (at 700m)	17C rising to a very warm (and exceptionally humid) 22C.
And in the valleys	Very warm indeed as afternoon temperatures approach 26 to perhaps locally 28C.

Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 24 June	Thursday 25 June
How windy? (On the summits)	Direction may well vary, 10mph or less.	South to southeasterly between 10 and 20mph; perhaps particularly gusty at times.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible	Generally small, although there may be sudden buffeting at times both on higher areas and some lower slopes.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain not expected	Small risk thunderstorms Risk thunderstorms developing later afternoon giving locally torrential rain.
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any	Little if any although patches may form near rain Mountains extensively cloud free. In thunderstorms, fog may be extensive some hills, in places from lower slopes up.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine. Hazy.	Periods of sunshine. Persistent haze.
How Cold? (at 700m)	18C rising toward an exceptionally warm 21 to perhaps 25C.	Exceptionally warm 25 to 28C in afternoon. Unusually humid.
And in the valleys	Rising to 28 to perhaps 31C in the afternoon.	Between 30 and perhaps 34C in the afternoon.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 24 June, 2026**

Exceptionally warm and humid most mountain areas until later Friday. The range in temperature in the detailed forecasts for Wednesday and Thursday reflect uncertainty in just how far north the extreme heat will penetrate - with more recent forecasts suggesting the (even) more extreme temperatures.

Scattered thunderstorms on Thursday and Friday, whilst over the weekend, progressively less warm as fronts begin to come in off the Atlantic, bringing bands of rain and low cloud, particularly affecting western mountains.
