

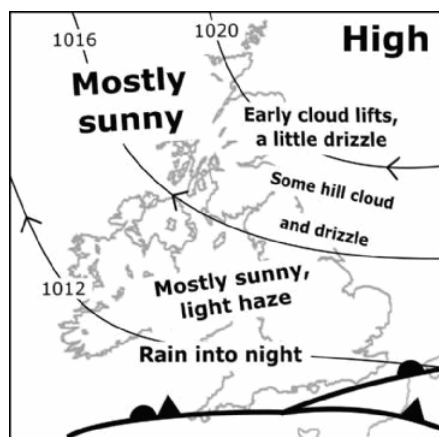
# Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

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## General Summary for Tuesday, 25 August, 2026



### British Mountain Summary:

#### Based on forecast chart for noon 25 August, 2026

Early cloud and drizzle in northeast England and east Scotland. Cloud lifts, sun breaking out; cloud caps cling to high east Scotland tops, a little light rain passing westward. Wales and west parts of England and Scotland largely dry with little hill cloud. Wind strengthens into night in England and Wales.

| <b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>                | Easterly 20 to 25mph, lighter speeds likely for a time but strengthening again into evening, notable gusts forming approaching 35-40mph into nighttime.                                                                                                                                  |
| <b>Effect of wind on you?</b>                     | <b>Fairly small but gusty in places, particularly into evening when walking becomes more strenuous on exposed tops.</b>                                                                                                                                                                  |
| <b>How wet?</b><br>(Precipitation and its impact) | <b>Drizzle mostly northeast</b><br>Drizzle in the air, frequent for periods early in day in northeast Pennine areas making it generally damp, but small amounts of rain in total. Patchier further south and west, more often dry Ingleborough area, and likely widely dry afternoon.    |
| <b>Cloud on the hills?</b>                        | <b>Mostly eastern hills in morning and later</b><br>Cloud banks likely drifting over higher slopes in the morning, locally to mid-heights in eastern North Pennines for a few hours, tending to thin and break up. Later, cloud will return to high terrain of N Pennines from the east. |
| <b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>              | <b>50% rising to 90%, later deteriorating over N Pennines</b>                                                                                                                                                                                                                            |
| <b>Sunshine?</b><br>Air clarity (below cloud)     | Fairly cloudy start especially east, tending to break up to give some sun. Visibility very good, but some eastern hills mistier for several hours, slight haze southern areas.                                                                                                           |
| <b>How Cold? (at 700m)</b>                        | 9C rising to 12 to 14C, coolest eastern North Pennines.                                                                                                                                                                                                                                  |
| <b>And in the valleys</b>                         | 10C from dawn, rising to 17 to 20C afternoon, warmest western Yorks Dales. Eastern valleys of N Pennines may stay a degree cooler.                                                                                                                                                       |

**All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 26 August, 2026**

Low pressure to the south will develop and drift across Britain into the second half of this week bringing increasingly wet, warm, and humid conditions widely. Areas of rain will drift northward during Wednesday, possibly thundery showers forming over England & Wales. Heavy and thundery rain likely affects England, Wales & southern Scotland on Thursday-Friday, potentially prolonged heavy falls bringing a risk of flooding locally. Northwest Scotland likely driest. The eastern Highlands often covered in low cloud. Strong gusty easterly winds prevail for a few days through midweek. Into the weekend it remains unsettled with areas of rain and heavy showers, plus cooler northwesterly winds developing.
