

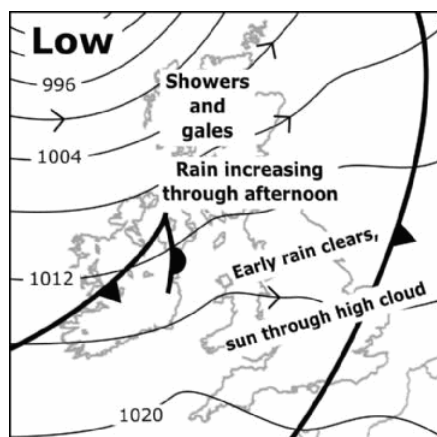

General Summary for Monday, 7 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 7 September, 2026

Showers in west Scotland from dawn, spreading east. Gales across the highlands, severe northwest, feeling cold. Early rain in England and Wales breaks for sun through high cloud, windy in the north. Prolonged rain arrives into south Scotland from midday, spreading into north England with time, and later Wales.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Morning rain clears, only later returning; becoming blustery

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 7 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 20-30mph, some variability, lowest speeds over Yorks Dales NP, but a strengthening trend with time, notably later when speeds will suddenly approach 40mph N Pennines, more widely into evening. May be fairly small at times over Yorks Dales, but a nuisance breeze all day towards the north, later deteriorating to strenuous conditions with buffeting and wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Early and late rain, otherwise mostly dry Rain from overnight on and off beyond dawn, breaking up to leave only spotty showers and a prolonged dry window from later morning through afternoon. From later afternoon, rain returns to N Pennines, showery at first but gradually more frequent and widespread into nighttime.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Lifting above the summits for much of the afternoon Early varied cloud over the hills, fairly extensive just at dawn but soon lifting during to mostly patches over higher tops, breaks forming above many summits afternoon. Some patches return over N Pennines later, increasingly spreading into evening as rain returns. Rising to 70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sun mainly eastern dales, more widely for a few hours though weakened by high cloud. Visibility good when dry, reduced in rain.
How Cold? (at 700m) And in the valleys	Around 10 or 11C most of the day, slight rise east fells. Feeling like 0C in direct wind, or cooler later over N Pennines.. 12C at dawn, then only small rise, maximum 16C Yorks Dales NP; staying cooler N Pennines, then sharply cooling into night.

Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 8 September	Wednesday 9 September
How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 35-45mph, gusts at times to 50mph over high tops, particularly later.	Northwesterly 30-35mph to start, gradually easing, around 20mph afternoon, shifting westerly and further easing.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking often arduous in exposure, strongest gusts notably challenging balance; significant wind chill.	Blustery in exposure to start and feeling chilly, gradually easing, to small effects later.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers Showers drift onto the fells from the west most of the day. Some more frequent falls forming afternoon, a heavy burst here and there; staying more showery eastern Yorks Dales NP until late.	Little or none Small chance a few spots of light rain affecting the N Pennines, but more likely entirely dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly high fells, variably lower Banks of cloud variably cover the high western fells, mostly during and just after showers, but lifting off the fells for periods as well. Later, banks increasingly more frequent and prolonged, first in the north.	Soon clearing A little patchy cloud in the morning around western fells and high tops, soon lifting, breaking above the summits for much of the day.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50%	Rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bursts of sunshine. Visibility generally good but a haze, particularly western areas.	Mostly sunny, some fair weather cloud around. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 700m)	7 or 8C. Feeling below freezing in direct wind.	7 or 8C rising to 11C. Feeling around freezing early, wind chill effect easing.
And in the valleys	9C at dawn, rising to 12 or 13C, though will vary around showers, later trending cooler.	8C at dawn, rising to 15C.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 8 September, 2026**

Generally unsettled through next week with spells of rain and showers moving in from the Atlantic, accompanied by strong to gale force mountain winds. Temperatures will vary, mildest toward the south, but cooler air moves in from the north at times bringing higher Scottish tops occasionally close to freezing point, feeling cold in the wind chill. A few high pressure ridges bring settled windows, notably afternoons of Wednesday and Friday; northwestern areas, particularly in Scotland, will tend to hold onto some hill cloud despite high pressure.

An unsettled weekend is indicated, followed by a rising chance of longer settled windows from mid-month, particularly England and Wales. Temperatures will be generally near or above average, best sunny windows east hill groups.
