

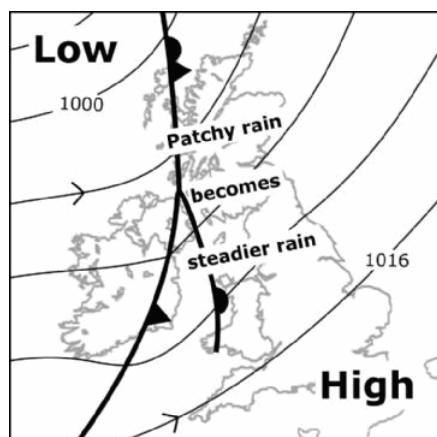
Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

The entire Yorkshire Dales National Park and North Pennines AONB, including the Three Peaks and Cross Fell, plus Howgills, also south to Forest of Bowland.



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General Summary for Thursday, 10 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 10 September, 2026

Windy, gales over Scottish mountains and increasingly on higher tops of England & Wales. Rain starts patchy and light but becomes persistent over western hills, extending eastwards with time. Cloud capping most high tops, lowering in rain particularly in the west.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Wind strengthens, reaching gales high tops. Rain develops.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 10 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly, rising from 20-25mph at first, to 30-35mph middle of day, sustained 40mph during afternoon, later gusts 50mph higher tops particularly North Pennines. Moderating into night to 25mph. Walking becomes strenuous, then arduous in afternoon in exposure on higher terrain, strongest gusts requiring effort to maintain stability; notable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain moves in from west, mainly afternoon Some drizzly rain drifts onto the hills mostly around Tebay, but substantially dry until afternoon when a larger rain band sweeps in from the west to then persist over a few hours, some heavier falls west Dales. Breaking up into showers from dusk.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Fleeting caps on high tops Banks will occasionally drift over high summits, mostly from Ingleton towards Tebay, but plenty of clear windows as well. From later afternoon, cloud will lower onto high terrain above 600m, increasingly filling in, lower in west. 80%, later deteriorating to 30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Windows of bright sunshine, high cloud builds, trending cloudier through afternoon. Very good visibility, a little haze western Yorks Dales NP; reducing later in rain.
How Cold? (at 700m) And in the valleys	8C rising to 10 or 11C afternoon, then lowering slightly into night. Feeling close to freezing as wind strengthens. 6 or 7C at dawn, rising to 14 to 16C afternoon, warmest in east.

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 11 September, 2026

Changeable west-southwesterlies prevail through mid September; often windy, gale-force winds for periods over higher terrain. A window of drier weather this Friday, then the next frontal system sweeps in overnight into Saturday with a sustained fall of rain moving southeastward, accompanied by upland gales for most places. Improving for better weather on Sunday, then wind and rain returns into Monday, staying showery into Tuesday. A mixed outlook likely continues later next week with rain most frequent in western Scotland. Temperatures varying, some cooler days especially in Scotland, but often fairly mild further south, at times quite warm and humid.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service, 2026.
